Dear Parents/Guardians,

Springtime is upon us and everyone is excited to have a change of seasons. We have had a busy winter as we tried to keep as normal a schedule as possible. Turtle Lake has been fortunate to have a very little interruption to our schedule because of COVID 19. This will definitely benefit our students in the long run by maintaining our academic standards during this time. While other schools were out, we managed to keep our doors open for our students.

Winter sports continued as scheduled with the boys and girls basketball teams doing quite well. The girls team won a playoff game and had a very successful season under the direction of first year head coach Angela Wagner. We are all looking forward to next year. The boys team under the leadership of head coach Jon Bussewitz advanced all the way to sectional finals. It is the farthest a Turtle Lake boys team has advanced. With a team stacked with Juniors the future looks bright for next year. Also, a special acknowledgement to our HS wrestler, Mason Quade, who made it to sectionals. Well done all student athletes. You have made us proud!

One of our top academic priorities this year has been working extensively with students to keep them on track to graduate. We have arranged students' schedules to help them get extra help during the day as well as providing after-school academic help for our 6th -12th-grade students. Students who need extra help are encouraged to stay after school from Monday- Thursday from 3:30 - 4:30. Students work directly with one of our teachers to get caught up or work to further their studies. If your child would benefit from a little extra help, please contact me and I can arrange for that to happen.

Another initiative we are requiring to help students focus, is that students are not allowed to have cellphones in the classroom. Students are instructed to put their phones in a designated area in the classroom to hold their phones at the beginning of each class. This prevents students from getting distracted and helps them to focus on the task at hand during the class. Students who are on the F list are also required to leave their cell phones in the office for the whole day. Cellphones are such a distraction for students and I believe this will help students to focus on their studies instead of their social lives.

On Tuesday, March 9th our 11th-grade students (Juniors) completed the ACT test. The ACT test helps to measure a student's preparedness for post-high school education. To better help prepare our students for the test, our Juniors worked with our English and Math teachers during our Rtl (Response to Intervention) time. This extra preparation for the test allowed students to polish their skills in certain areas and eased some of the anxiety that may come from taking it.

On Monday, March 15th our MS and HS choirs performed their Spring Concert. It was great to see our choir students back in action and live. Our previous concerts had been online but this time parents and close relatives were able to see the students perform live in the gymnasium in a well-spaced out format. I am very proud of our students for their resiliency this year and adapting well to wearing masks while singing. Also a shout out to Mrs. Molls for her leadership during this year and putting together a showcased performance of our students' talents.

The district will also be holding its annual 4K Round-up Day on Friday, April 23 and 30, 2021, from 8:00-3:00. This year, because of COVID, parents will be asked to call ahead and schedule appointments ahead of time to meet with school staff. Children who will be 4 years of age on or before September 1, 2021 are eligible to attend all day 4K this fall and may attend a preview of preschool during summer school in June. Also, any parent who has developmental concerns about their 3 year-old child, should call to get an appointment with the early childhood team. The goals of the 4K program is to enrich readiness and social skills that will help your child prepare for Kindergarten. Throughout the year in the 4K class, your child will have a chance to socialize with other children of the same age, listen to stories, learn by participating in age appropriate activities and gain positive self-esteem. Please call the elementary office as soon as possible at 715-986-4470 to reserve a time which best fits your schedule.

Finally, Summer School will take place June 7-25. Information and registration will be coming out soon. We again will be offering enrichment and remedial classes for reading and math along with all kinds of games, crafts, and fun. Please see that your child's registration is turned in as soon as possible because space in some classes will be limited. NEWS FROM ROOM 202

Mr. Hansen's second graders recently completed a hero project as a culminating activity for their latest reading unit.

Each student identified a hero in their life. Then she or he identified the character traits that their hero possesses by completing a checklist. Each student also compared and contrasted himself or herself to their hero by completing a Venn diagram.

The second graders used these graphic organizers to form writings about their heroes. It was interesting to read about the heroes in our second graders' lives!

What is one of the most influential natural forces in nature? Erosion! And Turtle Lake

second graders know all about it. Students made educated guesses and investigated the causes of canyons in our last science unit. The activity to follow is a class favorite!

In the lab activity: cornmeal canyons were created as a model landform. Students dripped water using a drip stick they made to place over this "land" to observe how water can change the lands shape and to understand how, over long periods of time, canyons can be formed through a similar process. Students followed up this lab activity by comparing and discussing multiple solutions for preventing erosion and theorized ways to keep water from washing away a hill modeled out of their cornmeal. "Blankets" and walls were the top theories. We will never look at a corn muffin the same



way again! Many of the students asked for the "recipe" for the cornmeal soil we used. Here it is:

1 ½ cups cornmeal + ½ cup table salt + ½ cup water (give or take) = 2 cups "land" Store in air tight container no more than 24 hours.

We also participated in our first-ever Rube Goldberg competition and built our first Rube Goldberg Machine! What is a Rube Goldberg Machine? "A Rube Goldberg Machine (RGM) is a crazy contraption which accomplishes a simple task in the most complicated and funniest way possible! Based on the "invention" cartoons of the famous, Pulitzer Prize-Winning Cartoonist, Rube Goldberg. His drawings and imagined machines are at the heart of the Rube Goldberg Machine Contest. They use everyday items (mostly junk!), they tell a story, and most important of all —



they make you laugh!" This year's theme was "Shake a Box of Nerds Candy" till they pour out. We used the theme "methods of travel" to tell our contraption story.

A big shout out to Mr. Baert (Turtle Lake's own High school Chemistry and Physics Teacher along with being the advisor for the High School RGM Team) for his expertise,

patience and inspirations and helping us become involved! Also, a warm shout out to Charlie Miller for creating her own candy machine at home and bringing it in to share with our class. We even used it to receive a piece of candy. Thank you, Charlie!! She said she was inspired by our building of contraptions in our classroom for RGM!

Spring Assessment Season

As we look forward to spring's arrival, which reminds me that the spring assessment season is also around the corner. The juniors just recently took the state-mandated ACT exam while students in grades 3-8 plus 10 will soon be taking the Forward exam. After the Forward exam, freshmen and sophomores will embark on taking the ACT Aspire, which is a great predictor for how they will eventually score on the ACT as juniors. Lastly, students who are enrolled in AP courses will have their finals take place in the beginning to middle of May. Scheduling for 2021-22 April will bring "Scheduling season" into full gear as students will start to schedule their classes for the 2021-22 school year. In the beginning of April, students in grades 5-11 should be bringing home their scheduling packet for you to go over as a family and then to make decisions together. One new wrinkle we will be trying to incorporate will be having all elective teachers video tape descriptions of their classes and put them online so you can view them from home and learn more about our offerings for next year. Every year, the Wisconsin Educational Media and Technology Association (WEMTA) sponsors a program called Battle of the Books. those mailed back this spring to learn about the com-





Language Register

In English Language Arts class, the topic of word choice is discussed frequently. The words individuals choose to use when sharing ideas convey many things about them. When communicating ideas, speakers consider the denotation or dictionary definition of a word. In addition, speakers

tion or dictionary definition of a word. In addition, speakers consider the connotation or emotional ideas connected to a word. Speakers choose positive or negative words that reflect attitudes about topics. An additional area discussed in English Language Arts class is language register. Language register refers to the level of formality associated with language. Two of the main language registers used are the formal register and the casual register. When the formal language register is used, individuals speak in complete sentences, avoid slang, and use academic vocabulary. However, when speakers use the casual language register, words are more general, and slang is used during a more personal exchange of ideas.

It is important for speakers to know how to shift between different language registers so situations don't become awkward. The appropriate language register depends on many things including the following: the audience (who), the topic (what), the purpose (why), and the location (where). If the formal language register is expected but not presented, the results can be less than desirable. Individuals might not take the ideas of the speaker seriously based on the word choice used. In addition, listeners might find the ideas offensive based on the word choice used. When this occurs, communication ends. In order to ensure effective communication, speakers consider language registers so ideas can be shared in a thoughtful manner with others.

The middle school students engaged in many projects during the third quarter that required them to share ideas using the formal language register. The eighth grade students researched and summarized information about historical figures and presented it during the Revolutionary

War Wax Museum project. In addition, the eighth grade students prepared for and attended interviews as part of the career unit. The seventh grade students shared ideas connected to various pieces of text about the Holocaust. The sixth grade students shared ideas related to the concept of restorative justice when they read Touching Spirit Bear by Ben Mikaelsen. The students did an amazing job understanding the importance of the topics, and their use of formal language reflected this sophisticated level of understanding.

WISCONSIN MATHEMATICS LEAGUE CONTEST RESULTS

Each month beginning in October, several TLHS students have participated in a series of monthly math contests sponsored by the Wisconsin Mathematics League. Each contest consists of six challenging problems that require creativity and perseverance in working out the solutions. The level of difficulty is such that only a few students across the state get all six problems correct. It is outstanding to get four or five correct and still very good to get two or three correct. Even getting one problem correct shows good effort. The authors of the contest problems strive to create problems that encourage students to enjoy a challenge and to stimulate problem solving discussions later in class.

In October, there were 13 Turtle Lake students participating in the contest. Paige Davis led the Laker mathletes, getting three problems correct (and thus scoring 3 points). Morgan Maier and Kaylee Buck each had two points. Five other Lakers had 1 point each. 11 TL students took part in the November contest. Brandyn Ramelfanger, Paige Davis, and Becca Peterson each had 2 points and 3 other Lakers each had one point. There were 15 TL students who took part in the December contest. Kirstan Keppen lead the way with 3 points followed by Paige Davis with 2. Two others had 1 point each. In January, 13 students took part. Paige Davis led the way with 3 points followed by Becca Peterson and Morgan Maier with 2 points each. There were 4 Lakers with one point. 14 TL students participated in the February contest. Paige Davis managed to get an outstanding 5 problems correct. Morgan Maier, Kody Nitchey, and Shayna Rainey each had 2 points

This is the sixth year that Turtle Lake students have been participating in this contest. The TL team leader last year was Connor Ofelt with a total of 21 points for the season followed by Roy Davis with 16 and Casey Kahl with 12. Paige Davis currently has 15 points with one contest remaining this season.

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High School English Electives

In the high school, students are engaged in a variety of activities in their English classes. There are a wide range of classes that students can take that will cover their English credits. There are many electives that students can choose from when they are Juniors and Seniors, from writing based classes to literature and Advanced Placement classes. Having electives allows students to choose classes that they are interested in, instead of having to be in a class that they are not interested in.

In Creative Writing students just finished their poetry unit where they wrote a variety of different poems on different topics. They have written a wide range of poems and to celebrate their favorite one we did a mini poetry slam in class to wrap up the unit. They are now working on updating a classic short story of their choice, where they have to leave the figurative language and stylistic elements, but translate it into how we would talk today. When they finish that students will be creating their own children's book.

Additionally, in Social Issues Literature, we have just finished reading our Mental Health text The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night Time, by Mark Haddon. This text is written from the perspective of an individual that has Asperger's Syndrome. We are looking and discussing why this is a social issue and how we can relate to others that don't think like us. We will then move onto an Independent Reading unit where students will choose from a variety of other mental health texts and respond to the social issue that is central to their text in particular.

Not to be out done, in Plays we acted out little one-act plays and monologues that they will be performing at the end of the school year to a different class. In this class we look at plays and how their purpose is discovered and interpreted in a variety of ways. We have finished reading the play The Raisin in the Sun by Lorraine Hansberry. Then we watched an online version of both the play (stage) and a film in order to discuss how a script goes from the page to the stage to the big screen by looking at interpretation of the stage notes and the tone and mood that needs to be given.

In the last elective, AP English Language and Composition, we have just begun our last text. This unit we are putting everything together that we have learned about through the course of the year in order to see what we still need to work on before the exam in May. We are reading a nonfiction text called Nickel and Dimed: On (not) Getting by in America, by Barbara Ehrenreich. This text focuses on poverty in the US. During our readings, students will be looking closely at the introductions and conclusions of the text and how they contribute to the argument, what the argument is, what the purpose of the diction and syntax that the author uses, and how everything can come together to be an effective text. They will also be reading and synthesizing other sources on poverty to understand the issue that brought this text to life.

Overall our upperclassmen have been working really hard in the English electives writing, looking at different perspectives, and constructing ideas of their own. They are exploring different areas of English and finding value in them at the same time that they will be able to take with them into their lives after they leave Turtle Lake high school. I am seeing my students come into their own person, standing up for what they believe and using their imagination in ways they did not think was possible.
